DIRECTIONS – 25 MINUTES

- ◆ Turn right at Springfield Center traffic light onto Route 11 West.
- ◆ Bear right after Mobil Gas Station onto Route 10/106.
- ◆ About 2 miles down, turn right onto Route 106. Follow Route 106 into Woodstock – 20 minutes.



MUST SEE ATTRACTIONS AND GALLERIES

SUGGESTED TOUR



This tour provides some of the most scenic towns and villages in Mid-Vermont.

There is much to do and see, so you will want to get an early start. Drive north on Route 106 to scenic Woodstock, Vt. This town has many well preserved homes built in the early 1800's. After a walk around the village green you will want to stop at the following points of Billings Farm and Museum. See farm life as it was then, and is now, on the shared site of an 1890 farm museum and an ongoing dairy operation; fun for everyone.

Next, go east on Route 4 to Quechee, Vermont where you will want to visit the following: Quechee Gorge – Vermont's Little Grand Canyon formed during thousands of years of erosive action by the Ottauquechee River which rests 165 feet below. It is one of the outstanding natural spectacles of the state. Beautiful views, hiking, waterfalls, campgrounds and a state park.

Vermont Institute of Natural Science and Raptor Center is living museum which introduces visitors to the owls and hawks of Northern New England

Simon Pearce Glassworks. Watch glass blowing and visit the craft shop, with first and second quality Simon Pearce Glass, beautiful selections of Irish hand thrown pottery, American quilts and Irish woolens. Visit the cafe; overlooking waterfall and covered bridge in Quechee.

Quechee Gorge Village & Antiques and Collectibles Center will includes a Craft Center, Country Store, The Christmas Loft, Yankee Diner, Stained Glass Workshop and many specialty shops on Route 4.
